







Alumni Gill & Stephanie's Final Chapter Their Story Continued...


Pepsi was inspired by their story...

supplies they need for underwater robotics, rocketry, high-altitude ballooning, and more. Their enthusiasm is not contained to West Mesa High School, but these JROTC students also engage their younger peers and provide mentorship to students in middle school programs. Beyond that, the projects also develop resilience, dedication to teamwork, and so much more. The instructors teach much more than you would expect in a JROTC program. Stephanie explains, "As a whole, the Navy JROTC has helped prepare me for life after high school because

time management." Gill goes on, "The Navy JROTC helped me tremendously with my life after college. This is because it helped me figure out what I wanted to do. Everyone always says well if you go to the Navy JROTC you are going to have to go to the service. Well, that isn't true, and Major and

Senior make this very clear. They are invested in whatever we want to do after high school. So,

we did career planning, and we also learned a lot of skills early on like budget management and

for our junior and senior year, Major has us do a plan for after we graduate. This is an actual assignment where we come up with a plan and stick with it throughout the year. This helped me figure out the steps I needed to take. It also helped me understand the importance of scholarships and grants." Gill and Stephanie graduated from West Mesa High School in 2018 and married. They both attend the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, where Stephanie is majoring in electrical engineering and Gill is majoring in computer science with the goal to build a career in

cybersecurity. They both continue to support the students at West Mesa High School by

working with Major Hendricks and Senior Chief Nicholson to students troubleshoot and develop new skills through their project-based learning (PBL). The Carrillos know that the grants received by their Navy JROTC meant that donors believed in their potential. Stephanie adds, "Investing in public education not only helps the current students. It helps the instructors because they also have to expand their field of knowledge, leading to better instructors. It also helps future students because they will have more resources to learn from (including instructors, materials, and the current students that can become


