ABOUT THE EDUCATION FOUNDATION

ESTABLISHED IN 1995

The APS Education Foundation is the 501(c)3 established to receive and disburse grants for the support of education and educational projects for the Albuquerque Public Schools.

Thirty members of the Board of Directors govern the Foundation representing businesses, corporations, parents, and non-voting APS representatives. The Board's current 2018-2021 strategic plan has three focus areas:

- Internal and external marketing
- Fundraising strategies
- Leadership infrastructures

\$8 MILLION

Over 25 years the Foundation has facilitated more than \$8 million in support of APS students and teachers through the launch of grant funding programs.

\$500,000

Each year \$500,000 is budgeted to be disbursed to support innovative classroom practices and educational opportunities.

In addition to the grant programs, the Foundation supports important district-wide initiatives in APS like social and emotional learning, professional development, special education programs, and encourages the community to give generously to APS teachers, students, and programs. Because of these efforts with our community, our teachers feel supported, our students are inspired and our public schools are stronger.

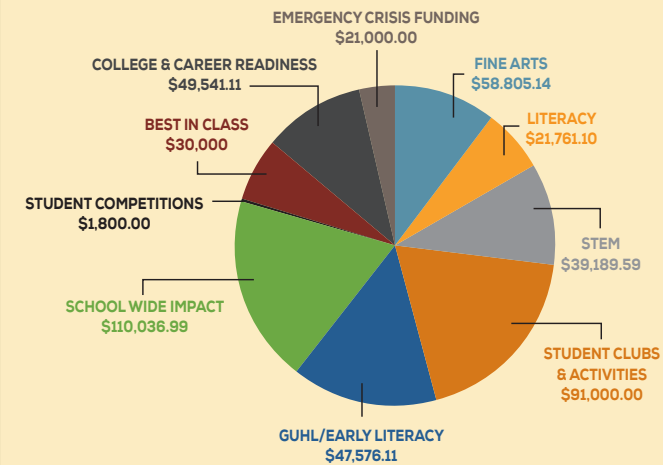
Held in July and hosts more than 240 golfers. **This event raised more than \$77,000.**

Gold Bar

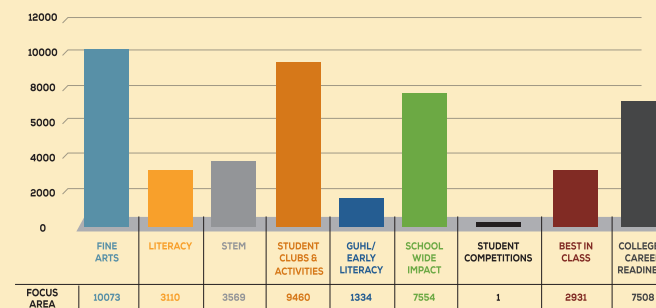
Held in April, is a celebration and recognition event hosting over 450 guests. **This event raises more than \$80,000.**

SPRING 2019 | JILL ROGERS COLLET PARK ELEMENTARY PROJECT: PRACTICING SELF REGULATION 378 STUDENTS SERVED

Thank you so much! This grant has allowed me to build a more "real world" way for students to practice self regulation. The ability to add more board games for the students to utilize to work on self-regulation, allowed students to continue to build their skills. The first time students played board games, many cried and could not even play a game because they got too upset if they did

not get the color pawn they wanted, or they did not get to go first. By the second year, students were able to problem solve and work out issues with each other. Students were able to play games without needing adult intervention. One 3rd grade student who would cry and be unable to play the game, eventually would say, "It doesn't matter if you win, because you won't always win."

SPRING 2019 | LAURA BERLIN ECADEMY VIRTUAL HIGH SCHOOL PROJECT: HEALTH INITIATIVE 90 STUDENTS & 20 STAFF MEMBERS SERVED

Many of our students are in risk populations. In checking in with them after both the mindfulness classes and the yoga classes, they stated that they could see how it could help them if they remember to practice regularly. A student stated that, "Yoga makes me a better wrestler and person. I used to

argue a lot and my hips were really tight. Yoga helps me deal with both of those things, plus it's relaxing."

The shifting of school due to Covid was a major factor and halted the yoga/mindfulness program in March. This term, however, we are continuing to offer Yoga for Lunch online.

SPRING 2019 | SILVINA FARMIN ALBUQUERQUE HIGH SCHOOL PROJECT: CRAFTY DAWGS 160 STUDENTS SERVED 50 WERE ACTIVELY ENGAGED IN PROJECTS

As a Title 1 school, there are many students in need of winter hats. Our students made 160 crochet hats for their fellow classmates. Students also made 85 blankets and pet beds for Bernalillo County Animal Shelters; and made pet toys in collaboration with Positive Links, a non-profit group that teaches community agencies the co-relation between animal abuse and domestic violence. Pet supplies were given to families and persons adopting animals. In light of the pandemic, the group made fabric masks (PPE) for the Transgender Resource Center (our class made around 75 masks before we had to switch to distance learning.)

SPRING 2019 | BRIAN ACUESTA CIBOLA HIGH SCHOOL PROJECT: ROBOTICS TEAM EXPANSION 15 STUDENTS SERVED

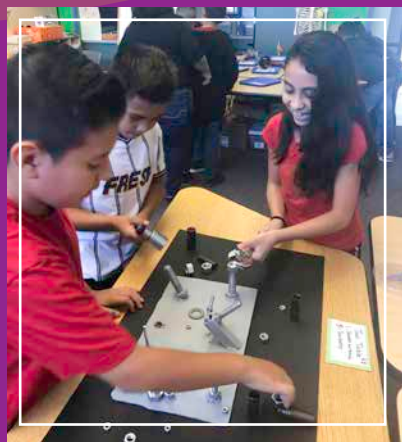
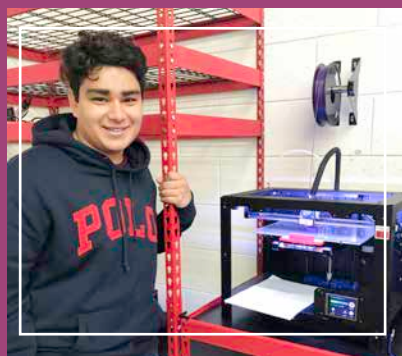

The entire program is hands-on and promotes engineering. Students are very engaged in the learning environment. This program allows for extensive collaboration between groups of students.

An example of the impact of this program: one of our students had

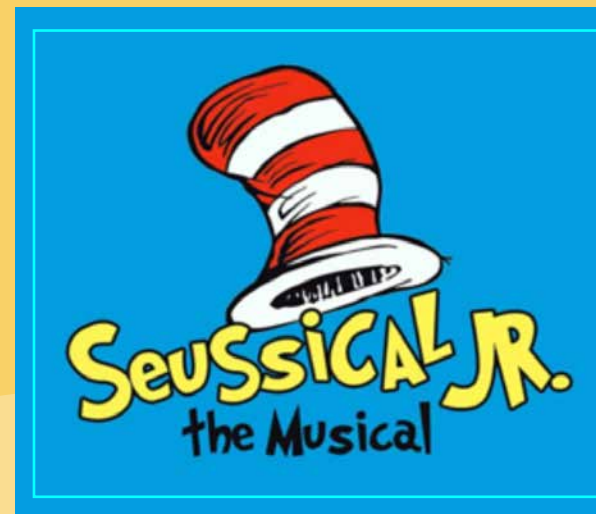
planned on studying the law and becoming a lawyer, but had a change of heart after participating on the Robotics team. She decided to attend UNM's College of Engineering the following year to study electrical engineering and mechatronics.

This project could benefit other schools who have robotics after school programs. It could also be used to create new after school programs at the middle and high school level. We look forward to sharing this program and our success with it with other schools.



GRANTEE STORIES

ROOSEVELT MIDDLE SCHOOL'S SUMMER SEUSS PROJECT



Upon receiving a Fall 2019 Horizon Fine Arts grant, Roosevelt Middle School students directed and produced their own Seussical Junior musical production. The performance, a fun, upbeat "mash-up" of Dr. Seuss stories, featured students in sixth through eighth grades. For months, cast and crew members rehearsed and dedicated countless hours for their big debut on March 20-21, 2020 at the Vista Grande Community Center in Sandia Park. The stage was set and the actors were ready, but instead of action, there was silence as the world faced the pandemic. Ms. Robyn Clarke and Kiely Banks, Roosevelt Middle School teachers and sponsors, with the support of Principal David Roberts were committed to moving forward with the production while staying

safe and healthy. The show must go on! After coordinating efforts with the production's video editor and camera man, cast members were invited to arrive in shifts, practicing strict social distancing, to record some video and audio portions of the show. Almost all of the cast members were able to participate, and after hours of sound and video editing, the recorded performance was complete. Although students were not able to perform in front of a large audience as planned, the cast's ingenuity and passion for fine arts remained intact. Roosevelt Middle School anticipates performing the full production in front of a full audience in the Summer of 2021. Roosevelt Middle School was awarded \$3,875 to help purchase costumes, props and sound equipment.

ESPORTS

Esports is an NMAA (New Mexico Activities Association) approved official activity with competition between individuals or teams. Like traditional sports, esports requires individual skill, practice and teamwork for success. Strategy and planning, coordination of effort, critical thinking and collaboration are also essential competitive elements.

APS esports is committed to offering our high school students the opportunity to play competitive esports by providing an equitable playing field across the district. Through esports, we help our students realize their full potential by offering inclusion, enabling collaboration, improving confidence and inspiring excellence.

APS esports awarded 100 esports scholarships, funded by an APS Education Foundation Success Award Grant, to APS high school students. A total of \$12,000 was distributed to students to cover the costs of NMAA registration fees and jerseys required to participate in the spring 2020 season. This brought districtwide esports to all APS high schools which provided equity and inclusion for all students.

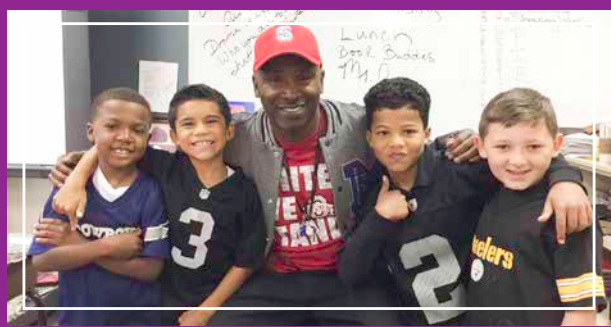
"There is a stigma about female gamers, and I want to show society that playing video games is not limited by race or gender." Vy N.

COMMUNITY GRANT READERS PANEL A VOLUNTEER STORY

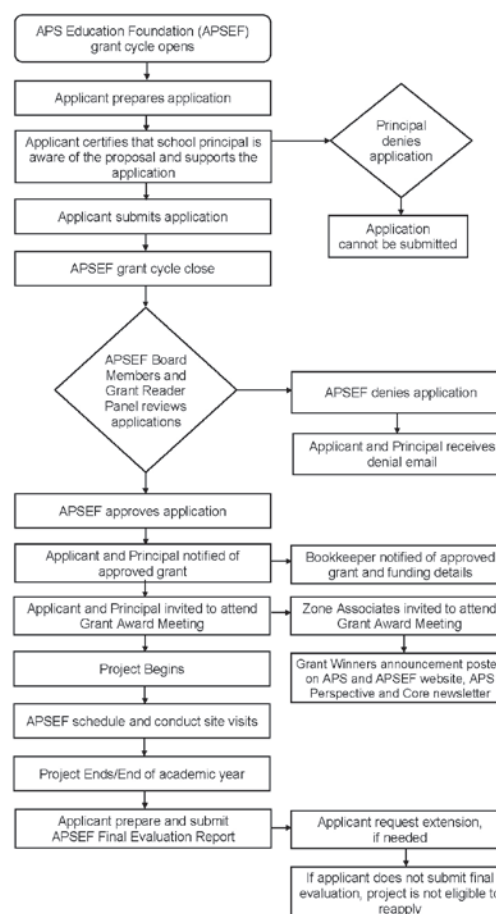
The APSEF Community Grant Readers Panel play a critical role in deciding how funding reaches students and teachers in Albuquerque Public Schools. Consisting of Foundation Board members, retired educators, district staff and

most importantly - community volunteers, the panel meets twice a year to distribute nearly half a million dollars used to meet APS school budget needs. Community volunteers are responsible for reading and scoring more than 100 grant

applications in the Fall and Spring of each school year. This opportunity allows volunteers to understand the challenges that educators face and help improve student learning experiences in the classroom. Volunteers select the funding

area in which they are most interested ranging from STEM, Fine Arts, Literacy and Student-Focused Activities. All applications are scored based upon meeting the district's top priorities and the award requirements.

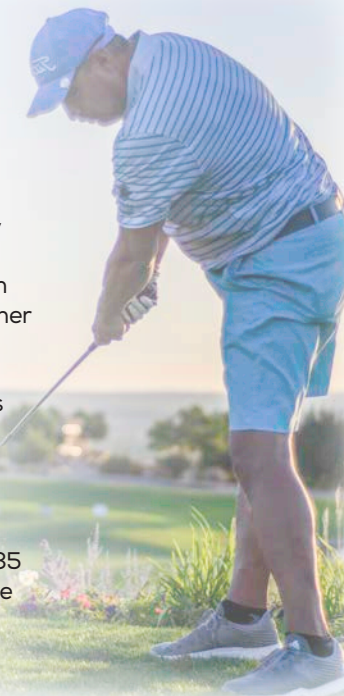

RECOGNITION & EVENTS



Over the past seven years, the Superintendent's Cup, presented by B & D Industries, has raised much needed funds for the APS classroom and school grants by bringing together business leaders across the region for a great game of golf. This year's tournament, held July 18, 2019, was the last for Superintendent Raquel Reedy to host as she retired in the Spring of 2020.

The 2019 Superintendent's Cup hosted more than 230 golfers and 35 volunteers who together raised more than \$75,000 for the Foundation's grant programs.



The annual Gold Bar event raises dollars for innovative programs in APS schools funded through the APS Education Foundation's grants programs. This year proved to be extremely unique in so many ways, due to the many disappointments from 2020, the event was cancelled. The cancellation may have postponed and restructured the recognitions; but, the generosity of our supporters prevailed beyond our wildest dreams. The Gold Bar non-event raised more than \$76,000 to help spread the spark of innovation to our educators, schools and district departments.



As the 2020 Best in Class winner, the Special Education Department will move forward and provide in-depth training, giving teachers the guidance to identify their strengths and areas for professional growth related to seeing, understanding, teaching, challenging and advocating for underserved learners. The training will also work with administrators, gifted education and general education teachers in elementary and middle schools to create an implementation plan with "train the trainer" opportunities to build capacity district-wide. Professional development will include critical training on measurement and assessment. Also, in the spring of 2020, the Foundation was awarded a grant from Sandia National Laboratories to further enhance this professional development opportunity to expand the Schoolwide Enrichment Model.

Understanding that many demographic groups were underrepresented in gifted classes, the Special Education Department's data analysis and research indicated that many students lacked opportunity and exposure to higher level thinking activities and experiences necessary

for identification. In 2018, with a Foundation grant, the department implemented the Schoolwide Enrichment Model, providing experiences that center on exposure and interests, group training activities that focus on creative thinking and problem-solving strategies and enrichment that could be used for

investigation into authentic problems. A project that began with four pilot schools has grown to include 88 participating schools serving nearly 3,000 students. Schools are embracing the idea of whole-school enrichment clusters and demonstrating a renewed interest in student-driven learning opportunities.



Throughout the school year, the APS Education Foundation hosts Lunch & Learns at APS schools that have received grant funding. These fieldtrips to schools host a small number of donors and community partners allowing them to see their investments with the Foundation in action. Guests are able to meet with administrators, staff, teachers and students as well as members of the Foundation Board of Directors to learn more about new programs and projects, ask questions and share ideas. In 2019 and 2020, we visited West Mesa High School's first of its kind STEM Makerspace for a high school and Sandia High School's one and only Graphics Design Club which now provides class credit for students.

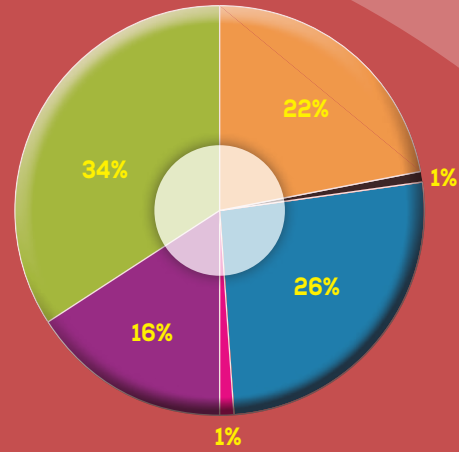

APS, the company donates one digital spot per board located on campuses across the city, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year offering APS the opportunity to promote community messaging, events and more.

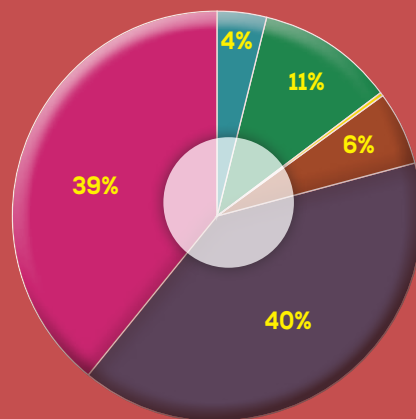
