Our Superintendent's Cup golf tournament



Because we see it happen every day. That's why the Foundation works to raise private funding and enlist public support for the students of this district. We've been around since 1995 and our impact can be felt in individual classrooms and in large, school-wide projects.

We do amazing things with our community's help, often through generous donations that create change and momentum. We also connect our larger community to district and school leaders because we know that human capital is the most powerful agent of change.



The APS Education Foundation has been ranked in the top 15 of K-12 educational foundations for the past two years, regardless of district size, by the Carruthers Institute. Our rankings exceed those of many larger communities.

IN 2016-17, THE FOUNDATION

- Awarded approximately \$534,000 in unrestricted funding to APS schools
- Funded more than 100 projects district-wide
- Reached 34,800 students

SINCE 2015-16, THE FOUNDATION HAS PLACED:

- More than \$1 million into APS classrooms through our direct-grant programs
- \$2.1 million into APS programs through funds we manage

And the best news is still to come. In 2017-18, we are budgeted to grant more than \$500,000 into classrooms and schools once again.

How do we do it? It's simple: Community support. Albuquerque's corporate partners - Intel, Wells Fargo, Nusenda Credit Union, Technology Integration Group, Sandia National Laboratories to name just a few band together with small businesses such as Raylee Homes: A New Generation and Westwind Landscape Construction to make us a potent force in every-day learning.

IS THERE MORE?

Absolutely. The Foundation hosts fundraising events such as the Gold Bar Gala and the Superintendent's Cup. We also were the driving force behind the district's new Hall of Honor, a place where our community's best educators will be recognized for lifetime achievement. Our events help support our key focus areas and show off the great works of our students and teachers.

HOW DOES THE FOUNDATION HELP APS?

The Horizon Campaign is the Foundation's annual drive to raise money for a variety of grant programs that go directly to classrooms, schools and initiatives throughout the district. There is no one-size-fits-all granting process, just as there's no one-size-fits-all way to learn in a classroom. Each of the Foundation grants has unique criteria, and some may be targeted at specific levels of the educational process.

The Foundation has different grant cycles available to teachers and schools throughout the year including:



Classroom grants for literacy, fine arts, and STEM (science/technology/ engineering/math) programs



Larger grants for academic projects



Grants supporting clubs and activities that keep students engaged





Grants that provide support for a key need as identified by students who are voting members of the Foundation's Board of Directors



Unexpected, unanticipated or unusual funding requests that don't fit in to the other award programs or occur outside the Foundation's grant windows

The Guhl Literacy Awards are awarded to elementary schools that have an innovative approach or idea to improving literacy on their campuses



The Walmart Blue Sky Award goes to a middle school schoolwide program that improves school culture, increases student engagement and/or improves academic achievement

When Manzano High School wanted to create a "bridge" program to help struggling eighthgraders get extra help as they moved into high school, the Foundation's Achieve Awards helped make it happen.

When Albuquerque High's burgeoning mariachi program needed extra uniforms to make certain the musicians looked their best, we came through.



When Lew Wallace Elementary asked for extra assistance to make its Native Arts Club more viable - boom! - kids got the help they needed.

Our Achieve Awards are all about kidsduring school, after school, around-theclock. We awarded more than \$100,000 throughout the district, making sure students were exposed to things that stir the imagination and make school something to cherish.

The Foundation board awards grants of up to \$10,000 in the Achieve Awards grant program, and teachers throughout the district sing its praises.

HELP WHEN IT'S NEEDED MOST



Our Board of Directors sets aside money to help schools and APS programs with emergency or chronic needs that can't be funded through traditional methods. The district's growing antitruancy program was given its start by a Foundation Excellence Award. We've also funded the APS Community Clothing Bank and innovative programs at schools throughout the district.

In 2017, reacting to a critical funding gap, the Foundation helped the APS middle school

sports program. We can't fill the hole completely, but we were in first - and challenged others in the community to help do their part to keep this program viable.

In addition, we were able to fund critical and emergency needs at places like La Cueva High School to help its biology and JROTC programs. We helped get the Del Norte High choir program to a key performance. When the autism-specific program at McCollum Elementary School needed iPad covers a crucial need that saves equipment and money - we were there.

Horizon Awards



The Foundation's Horizon Awards put teachers in the driver's seat. For eight years, we've provided hundreds of classroom leaders with tools that allow them to innovate as they educate. Each year, teachers in STEM, literacy and fine arts classrooms submit proposals in a competitive process, with dozens receiving up to \$5,000 in funding.

Horizon starts at the grassroots level classrooms. We've placed hundreds of thousands of dollars into classrooms in every part of the city.

The impact is immediate. We've helped build a STEAM Academy with virtual reality tools at Petroglyph Elementary. We've expanded math opportunities at Manzano High. We've created a 21st century news platform at Albuquerque High and helped kids at James Monroe Middle School become playwrights. We've helped students at Madison Middle School become better singers, improved the drama productions at Valley High and expanded the music library at Washington Middle School.









AND THE LIST GOES ON

In 2016-17, the Foundation provided funding for 40 different projects throughout APS, totaling nearly \$100,000.

That's what the Foundation's Success Awards are for: a big, school-wide hit of up to \$25,000. In 2016-17, one of the programs we supported was Truman Middle School's Math Masters effort – a major, school-wide mentoring and tutoring program aimed at getting kids to grade level. It's an incredibly important goal, because Truman serves more than 1,000 students at its sprawling West Side campus.

STUDENTS HELPING STUDENTS



The APS Education Foundation has three student members who are voting members of the Board of Directors. Each year, we ask them to direct grant money to a key student need. In years past, they've helped direct funding to needs such as ACT/SAT prep materials, or difficult-to-finance college applications. In 2016-17, they decided upon helping the district's AVID program, which helps students with the potential to get to college realize that dream.

Educators will tell you that if you don't come from a family that's ever been to college, it's hard to conceptualize just how to get there. We tried to fix that with the Varsity Award, a \$23,000 grant that sent hundreds of APS students to colleges and universities in the area to learn just what post-secondary life is all about.

Students from throughout the district had the funds to visit the University of New Mexico, New Mexico State, Texas





Tech and Fort Lewis, among others.

That's just one reason we're proud of our board - it includes students who understand student needs, and gaps in funding that create problems. By helping kids have a handson experience, our Varsity Award helps get kids to college.



"The support and the success of students is huge when the APS Education Foundation is involved. We were fortunate this school year to have a grant that our schools could use for field trips and that grant meant the world to our students, their parents and the teachers as they moved out to colleges and universities to see and experience college life. Many of our students would not be able to extend themselves to those lengths and it was a privilege and an opportunity that our high school students may never get again. This is one of the major events that high school AVID students use to choose their path."


WHAT IS THE APS EDUCATION FOUNDATION?
